Principal's Message

This year the Department of Education has introduced new policies in schools relating to the Use of Mobile Phones and Digital Devices by students and the identification of gifted students across NSW government schools, through the High Potential and Gifted Education Policy.

In some schools these will bring significant changes and have great impact on the operation of classes. Despite the fact that the policies will not produce such great changes at Sydney Girls High there are aspects of the policies which are relevant to our school.

In the new Mobile Phone context, both the school and P&C Executives are in agreement that students at Sydney Girls HS are responsible and mature enough to be able to have their mobile phones at school, especially given the fact that many of our students are travelling from all parts of Sydney and are a long way from family. Additionally, there are many learning applications and class uses that provide highly effective teaching and learning strategies. These are regularly employed by SGHS teachers. Where the school will be making changes is the clarity of expectations of students and the consequences of any irresponsible use of phones and digital devices. While the majority of students have always understood the potential negative impact of social media and messaging, there are some occasions where thoughtful action has been absent. Research tells us that the best course of action is not to prohibit digital devices, rather the best outcomes are derived from

reinforcement of responsible use and effective communication. The school will consult with the SRC and the P&C on the optimum ways to ensure students:

- respect their peers and colleagues online
- minimize potential distraction in the classroom
- understand that filming teachers and classes without obtaining permission is not permitted
- comprehend that accessing unsuitable online material can have profound consequences

Respecting others is part of the culture of the school. Communication in person as well as online needs to be constructive and considered. Students and parents will be asked to sign a school agreement showing that conditions of acceptable mobile phone and devices use are understood and will be adhered to.

The High Potential and Gifted Education Policy is directed at the wide range of capacities and talents in young people across a range of endeavours. While NSW selective schools by their very nature focus on high academic attainment in aspects of learning across the core studies of English, and Mathematics, gifted students exhibit many other attributes. Some of these relate to academic learning such as high order reasoning and argument in Debating, and mathematical prowess alongside deductive reasoning in Mathematics, producing outstanding Chess players. There are however other talents that are identified in creative.

socioemotional and physical domains which are exceptional in their own right. These often also accompany the more traditional view of gifted students in the academic sphere.

We can see this in our school when so many students are exceptional athletes and sportswomen, performing artists, writers, designers, leaders and demonstrate many other accomplishments. These gifts are from the socio affective and physical domains, described by researcher Francois Gagne as being part of a suite of talents which can be developed into gifts through application and practice.

The Department of Education is wanting to ensure that the potential of all young people is nurtured and the broad range of exceptional talents is recognized in the population. Part of the policy also addresses the identification of gifted students from diverse cultures, with disabilities, and from disadvantaged backgrounds who have been substantially underrepresented in gifted education settings. At Sydney Girls High the challenge is to recognize that not all our gifted students present in the same way. Additionally, some students do have even greater potential than is initially shown and there may be inhibiting factors for them to realize their full potential. These factors warrant investigation in order to fully support students.

Deputy Principal Report

The month of February featured several highlights, notably the Year 7 Camp, ably organised by Head Teacher - Wellbeing, Ms Evans and Year 7 Student Adviser, Ms Chau. The camp is an important part of the school's transition program for new Year 7 students, a program that is ongoing and seeks to support all Year 7 students in their first year at SGHS. It was also pleasing to see so many Year 7 parents attending the annual Meet the Teacher event. This event has proved to be a successful way to introduce new parents to the teaching staff and provide an informal forum for questions and feedback. It was also great to see so many Year 7 parents attending the first Parents and Citizens meeting of the year. I urge parents to take the opportunity to participate in P & C as it is the principal way that they can have a voice in the functioning of the school.

Over the course of this term, the SGHS IT staff will be contacting parents inviting them to create an account for the new Parent Portal. The portal uses the Sentral application and allows the school to merge multiple sources of information into one point of contact. It was trialled last year with the departing Year 12 families, with Year 7, 2020 being the first current cohort to come on board. The invitation to participate is emailed to the parent email address contained in the school ERN database. This is the same address used to send notification for parent-teacher nights. Please check this account and ensure that you receive and act on the invitation.

Year 12 students are currently undertaking the second round of HSC assessment tasks, with reports due soon after. This is a time when students reflect on their learning and have the opportunity to discuss strategies for improvement with their teachers. It is a time for fine-tuning their study skills at the halfway point of the school-based assessment for the HSC. At SGHS, we are very fortunate to have the services of a strong learning support team, a team that has a great record in assisting our students to achieve their personal best. I urge senior students in particular to make an appointment with Ms. Cooke, our Senior Academic Mentor, should they wish to access this support.

Finally, the transition to Light Rail has progressed well so far this term, with

students travelling to and from Central railway station making use of the new transport system (see below)

As the term progresses students will be encouraged to transition to the Light Rail in anticipation of the current parallel 610 bus services ceasing. For students travelling eastwards, the current plan is that the line to Kingsford will commence operations in late Term 1 or Term 2. Again, existing bus services to these areas will continue during a transition period and further information will be provided to families as it is received by the school.

I wish all the best for the remainder of Term 1.



P & C

I work for Macquarie University as Director of Research Services (one of the central units of the University). My involvement with the P&C began shortly after my daughter started at SGHS in 2017 as a Year 8 entrant, but my husband's adult son and daughter attended SBHS and SGHS, graduating in the early 2000s, so I do have something of a history with the school.

The first P&C meeting for 2020 took place in in mid-February. Unfortunately, I couldn't be there, but I'm told the other P&C Executive members - Vice Presidents Dilani Gamage and Mark Grosser, Treasurer Matt Wade and Secretary Gabby Mane - managed it all wonderfully (of course!). Between us we have daughters in every year group and the executive has developed a deep knowledge of SGHS. The P&C is a terrific way of being involved in your daughter's education - I hope to meet many of you at the next meeting in March.

Andrea Connell, School Principal, and the Deputy Principals, Gregg Harrison and Geoff Denyer updated us on several matters:

 the year began for us all with the bushfire disaster - one of the school's counsellors has been seconded to Tathra to work with bushfire affected schools

- the novel coronavirus outbreak in China has been dealt with in accordance with the NSW Department of Education's requirements and the whole school community has cooperated to keep us safe
- school communication is being transitioned to the Sentral app
- the Light Rail is now the principal means of transport from Central to SGHS, though buses are still running for Year 7 students
- the new Year 7 students have begun well, and the Meet the Teacher afternoon on 25 February was a success
- a policy about mobile phone use will be released during this year in line with Department of Education expectations. SGHS will continue to allow girls to have their mobile phones with them, something that is important given that so many of our students travel a very long way.

P&C Treasurer, Matt Wade, gave an update on P&C finances and the various sources of funds:

- Uniform shop which provides a small donation to the school each year
- Canteen run as a facility to provide good affordable meals for the girls
- Car parking on school grounds managed by Rowing parents.

Matt Wade made the point that contributions from parents and from the P&C are essential to provide the rich co-curricular program that is available at SGHS.

Construction work on The Governors Centre continues with an expected completion date of mid November 2020. One of the concerns at the beginning of construction was that there might be hidden (and potentially costly) problems – for example, contaminated land – but happily nothing like this has arisen.

The Co-Curricular Program at SGHS was outlined and the advantages of being involved in co-curricular activities was highlighted. While cocurricular activities don't contribute to ATAR outcomes, they can be very important in the non-ATAR based admission schemes of international universities as well as entry schemes which are run by many Australian universities. More importantly, as was highlighted by Andrea Connell, gifted children can get bored and demotivated if just doing academic work, they need stimulation and encouragement beyond the classroom work of school.

The P&C Annual General Meeting and a normal business meeting will be held on Tuesday 17 March. We look forward to seeing you there.

Visual Arts students are embracing their Visual Arts learning and are busy exploring the exciting practices of artmaking and art study. We value the importance of extending stimulating and enriching teaching and learning learning experiences inside and outside the classroom. Years 9 and 10 will visit the Art Gallery of NSW this semester and experience a variety of exhibitions including ArtExpress 2020. The selected exhibitions will complement and extend their thematic approaches of investigation, being "City Issues" for Year 9 and "The Representation of Women and Feminism" in Year 10. Sydney is blessed with so many wonderful art spaces and we certainly encourage our students to experience gallery and museum visits.

Years 11 and 12 Visual Arts students

will visit the AGNSW to view various exhibitions including Art Express 2020 and the AGNSW Library, the latter to provide students with researching skills to assist in their art study practice.

On 12 February artist Megan Seres conducted a very inspiring masterclass in oil painting for our Year 11 and selected Year 10 Visual Arts students.

Megan spent the day with our students and she was very generous in sharing her expertise and knowledge about oil painting conventions with our students. The focus of her class was to understand how the "great masters" like

Rembrandt, Caravaggio and Vermeer painted their works in oils. Techniques such as passes and glazing were taught.

It was a most stimulating and engaging experience for our students and our they really mastered selected oil painting conventions. Megan was very impressed with the high standard of work our students created.

Careers

It is a pleasure to return to Sydney Girls High School for 2020. This year, you will see a number of Careers initiatives continue to run at Sydney Girls High, carrying on from a successful year in 2019. Planning and implementation is underway and I will keep you updated through the newsletter and notes sent home.

Parents are encouraged to sign up for *Job Jump*, which sends weekly newsletters about careers initiatives. Students have been informed about this, however many parents are also keen to be updated on upcoming events. The website is jobjump.com.au and when parents or students sign up, they should select Sydney Girls High School, then insert the school password which is *parrots*.

Year 10

Work experience organisation is underway. Students will be given a note to pass on to their parents or caregivers later this term. Work experience will run in Term 4, from the 16 - 20 November.

Later this year, I hope to run some careers lessons with Year 10 and work with their Year Adviser, Cindy Gunawan, to organise a mock interview day, developing the employability and communication skills of our students, required for the workforce as well as for certain course -entry interviews. This initiative ran for the first time in 2019 and was a great success, with students getting

practice and feedback on their job applications and interviews.

Students are reminded to check their email, as I will be sending out information regularly.

Year 11

I recommend students in Year 11 to access the resources located outside the Careers Office throughout the year, in preparation for 2021. I also urge them to attend any lunchtime talks I organise. Coming up on 23 March is a presentation by Professional Cadetships Australia, offering cadetships in business, engineering and IT.

This is a good time for you to explore different fields and help form an idea of what you might like to pursue in the future.

Year 12

It is my intention to ensure every student in Year 12 is interviewed to discuss their academic, personal and career goals. By the end of Term 3, all students in Year 12 should have a written Post-School Plan to help guide them on their journey for the remainder of Year 12 and into the future. These are dynamic documents - like all futuristic plans should be - and are made to change as needed. It is good to have a plan 'for the moment' and be able to adapt to changes, as they come.

I remind Year 12 to attend the talks

organised in March and April during lunchtimes, as well as those I will organise in the near future. I will always email students about these talks, so students must check their emails regularly. Furthermore, Year 12 students have been asked to register for the HSC Careers Expo, which will be held on the 28 May from 4pm-6:30pm. Parents are welcome, however students must indicate this in their registration so that I can purchase sufficient tickets. This is an invitation-only event and it is my expectation that all Year 12 students will attend. The more exposure to courses, industries and information students can have, the better informed their decisions will be for tertiary entry and their careers goals. The expo will be held at Hordern Pavilion, just across the road from our school near the Moore Park Entertainment Quarter.

Australian Business Economists Conference

On Wednesday 12 February, selected Year 12 Economics students attended the Australian Business Economists conference held at the Reserve Bank of Australia. The event consisted of three highly engaging presentations about topical issues affecting the Australian and global economies, allowing us to apply our knowledge of economics outside the classroom.

Economists from a range of businesses and organisations led insightful discussions about current issues of concern including Australia's droughts and bushfires, the Novel Coronavirus and the US presidential elections, prompting us to reflect on their economic implications. Climate change was the main point of discussion during the conference, with a focus on the different risks and opportunities in ensuring that economic growth does not conflict with environmental sustainability. A nationally coordinated response to tackle climate change was emphasised during the panel discussion, referring to the



significance of government policies, business training and investment as well as national advocacy in order to reach Australia's target of net zero emissions by 2050.

Overall, this event was a valuable experience as it allowed for personal engagement with complex topics, reminding us not only of the importance of keeping up to date with current events, but also having

informed opinions on issues that concern the national and global community.
